This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and what we cover.

Within the Early Years, Music is taught as part of the Expressive Arts and Design area of learning and daily opportunities arise for music making, exploring, singing and performing.

In KS1-3, Music is taught as part of the Creativity Value and is part of a weekly timetable and a 2 year rolling programme. Details of this plan can be seen below. We will be working on Cycle 2 for the 2024-2025 school year, with KS3 being on rotation B of this to allow for the 3 years of KS3, so covering the same skills but with a different focus. Barnaby class rotate through several of the themes and will be joining KS3 on rotation B of cycle 2 at a stage appropriate level.

In KS4 and 5 there are opportunities to explore music within ASDAN qualifications (Sound, rhythm, and music within Towards Independence as an example) should this be something a particular student is interested in.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

All pupils in Key Stage 3 are offered First access music tuition on PBuzz during the spring term, led by a Love Music Trust Tutor. This allows all our pupils 3 opportunities to develop skills linked to playing a tuned instrument alongside developing other musical concepts. All instruments and lessons are provided free of charge to pupils.

In other music lessons, a range of un-tuned and tuned percussion instruments are used to develop skills.

All pupils are able to attend a weekly 'sing, sign and symbol' session one lunchtime led by the communication team.

All pupils in KS3 upwards are able to attend the Park Lane Choir, which meets weekly at lunch time and is led by our music lead.

If a particular student has a real talent for music and they need further tuition, this would be arranged on a case by case basis. We currently have a number of 6th form students accessing drumming lessons with a local musician.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Each year Park Lane school puts on a Christmas performance, for all pupils. Each class approaches this in an appropriate way for each of the learners.

Through the planning, each age group has the planned opportunity to perform, either to another class/year group, or for those who attend assembly (KS2 upwards), for upper school. There are also opportunities for all to sing in assembly.

Key Stage 1 classes participate in the LMT Rex adventure project each year, which allows them to work with a LMT tutor for 6 sessions and it culminates in a visit to Congleton Park with other schools for a low-key performance and picnic.

At least 2 classes will be attending the LMT SEND music day. Last year this was Bollin and Barnaby, with parents and carers attending with Barnaby pupils, to allow them to access the event and have a shared musical experience with family members.

We are planning to have at least 1 visiting performer during the year, although who and when is not yet confirmed.

Parents are informed of appropriate opportunities to attend music/performance events outside of school time e.g. Be Hear Now or Live Music Now events, multi-sensory performances from companies such as Concrete Youth and Frozen Light and any other local performances such as those run by LMT.

School also provides music therapy via Nordoff Robins to those pupils it is deemed appropriate, giving them the chance to use music to express themselves.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

As a school we are developing access to music technology. We have recently received a donation from our PTA (FOPLSS) to allow us to buy instruments, iPads and Chromebooks to further develop our offer with regards music technology. This is being planned in to the future termly plans on a rolling programme.

Once this is established, we will be looking to create a 'music tech' ensemble, allowing pupils to come together to create and perform music using technology.

We are also hoping to access some funding from LMT through the government's funding to buy more instruments, including more accessible instruments for those with a physical disability.

Further information

Park Lane are also hoping to be a key player in LMT's expansion of its SEND provision, playing a key role in the development of activities, provision and support for SEND pupils across the new wider hub area. Our music lead is also on the steering group for LMT as the SEND representative.
